Important Information

For your safety

To prevent severe injury and loss of life/ property, read this section carefully before using the product to ensure proper and safe operation of your product.

WARNING

Power connection

- Use only the power source marked on the product.
- Do not overload power outlets and extension cords. This can result in the risk of fire or electric shock
- Completely insert the AC adaptor/power plug into the power outlet. Failure to do so may cause electric shock and/or excessive heat resulting in a fire.
- Regularly remove any dust, etc. from the AC adaptor/power plug by pulling it from the power outlet, then wiping with a dry cloth. Accumulated dust may cause an insulation defect from moisture, etc. resulting in a fire.
- Unplug the product from power outlets if it emits smoke, an abnormal smell, or makes an unusual noise. These conditions can cause fire or electric shock. Confirm that smoke has stopped emitting and contact an authorised service centre.
- Unplug from power outlets and never touch the inside of the product if its casing has been broken open.
- Never touch the plug with wet hands. Danger of electric shock exists.

Installation

- To prevent the risk of fire or electrical shock. do not expose the product to rain or any type of moisture.
- Do not place or use this product near automatically controlled devices such as automatic doors and fire alarms. Radio waves emitted from this product may cause such devices to malfunction resulting in an accident.
- Do not allow the AC adaptor or telephone line cord to be excessively pulled, bent or placed under heavy objects

Operating safeguards

- · Unplug the product from power outlets before cleaning. Do not use liquid or aerosol cleaners.


Medical

 - the handset batteries need recharging or have failed.

- We recommend using the batteries noted on page 4. USE ONLY rechargeable Ni-MH batteries AAA (R03) size.
- Do not mix old and new batteries.
- Do not open or mutilate the batteries. Released electrolyte from the batteries is corrosive and may cause burns or injury to the eyes or skin. The electrolyte is toxic and may be harmful if swallowed.
- Exercise care when handling the batteries. Do not allow conductive materials such as rings, bracelets, or keys to touch the batteries, otherwise a short circuit may cause the batteries and/or the conductive material to overheat and cause burns.
- Charge the batteries provided with or identified for use with this product only, in accordance with the instructions and limitations specified in this manual.
- Only use a compatible base unit (or charger) to charge the batteries. Do not tamper with the base unit (or charger). Failure to follow these instructions may cause the batteries to swell or explode.

For best performance

Base unit location/avoiding noise

The base unit and other compatible Panasonic units use radio waves to communicate with each other.

- For maximum coverage and noise-free communications, place your base unit:
 - at a convenient, high, and central location with no obstructions between the handset and base unit in an indoor environment.
 - away from electronic appliances such as TVs, radios, personal computers, wireless devices, or other phones.
 - facing away from radio frequency transmitters, such as external antennas of mobile phone cell stations. (Avoid putting the base unit on a bay window or near a window.)
- Coverage and voice quality depends on the local environmental conditions
- If the reception for a base unit location is not satisfactory, move the base unit to another location for better reception.

Environment

- Keep the product away from electrical noise generating devices, such as fluorescent lamps and motors.
- The product should be kept free from excessive smoke, dust, high temperature, and vibration
- The product should not be exposed to direct sunlight
- Do not place heavy objects on top of the




Battery installation

- USE ONLY Ni-MH batteries AAA (R03) size.
- Do NOT use Alkaline/Manganese/Ni-Cd batteries.

• Confirm correct polarities (\bigoplus, \bigcirc) .


Battery charge

Charge for about 7 hours.

• When the batteries are fully charged, the charge indicator goes off.





































Note when setting up

Note for connections

- The AC adaptor must remain connected at all times. (It is normal for the adaptor to feel warm during use.)
- The AC adaptor should be connected to a vertically oriented or floormounted AC outlet. Do not connect the AC adaptor to a ceiling-mounted AC outlet, as the weight of the adaptor may cause it to become disconnected.

During a power failure

The unit will not work during a power failure. We recommend connecting a corded-type telephone (without AC adaptor) to the same telephone line or to the same telephone line jack using a Tadaptor. Your Panasonic sales shop can offer you more information about connection possibilities.

Note for battery installation

- Use the supplied rechargeable batteries. For replacement, we recommend using the Panasonic rechargeable batteries noted on page 4, 7.
- Wipe the battery ends (⊕, ⊝) with a dry cloth.
- Avoid touching the battery ends (+), (a) or the unit contacts.

Note for battery charge

- It is normal for the handset to feel warm during charging.
- Clean the charge contacts of the handset, base unit, and charger with a soft and dry cloth once a month. Clean more often if the unit is exposed to grease, dust, or high humidity.

Note:

- It is normal for batteries not to reach full capacity at the initial charge. Maximum battery performance is reached after a few complete cycles of charge/discharge (use).
- Actual battery performance depends on a combination of how often the handset is in use and how often it is not in use (standby).
- · Even after the handset is fully charged, the handset can be left on the base unit or charger without any ill effect on the batteries.
- The battery level may not be displayed correctly after you replace the batteries. In this case, place the handset on the base unit or charger and let it charge for at least 7 hours.


























The handset features 2 soft keys and a joystick. By pressing a soft key, or by pressing the centre of the joystick, you can select the feature shown directly above it on the display.

B Joystick

By pushing the joystick ($[\![A]\!]$, $[\![V]\!]$, or [►]) repeatedly, you can:

- scroll through (up, down, left, or right) various lists or items
- adjust the receiver or speaker volume (up or down) while talking
- As all multiple items cannot be displayed on screen at the same time, you can quickly search the desired item to move screens by pushing the joystick right or left, instead of scrolling down or up line by line (page 26).



Temporary switching the display mode

You can select to display either a single item or multiple items on one screen at a time for the following features:

- menu list, phonebook list, caller list, redial list, and recorded message list
- handset top menu icons in function

You can temporarily switch the display mode as follows by pressing shown when viewing the lists or selecting menu icons with:

- multiple entries/all menu icons are shown on one screen at a time
- an entry/a menu icon is shown on one screen in large characters at a time

Note:

 You can set the unit to always show either single or multiple items beforehand by selecting "Single Item" Or "Multi Items" as the display mode setting (page 25).

Screen saver mode

The backlight goes dark when on a call or turns off completely after 1 minute of inactivity if the handset is not on the base unit or charger.

Activate the handset display again by:

- pushing the joystick left (◄) or right [►] when on a call.
- pressing (**O) at all other times.

Turning the power on/off

Power on

Press [> 0] for about 1 second.

Power off

Press [*0] for about 2 seconds.



Adjusting the receiver or speaker volume

Editing/erasing/storing

Note:

 - To insert a number, place the cursor to the right of where you want to insert the number, then press the appropriate dial key.

Pause (for PBX/long distance service users)

A pause is sometimes required when making calls using a PBX or long distance service. When storing a calling card access number and/or PIN in the phonebook, a pause is also needed (page 20).




















Example: If you need to dial the line access number "0" when making outside calls with a PBX:

- $[0] \rightarrow \mathbb{P}$
- 2 Dial the phone number. \rightarrow [\rightarrow]

• A 3 second pause is inserted each time **P** is pressed. Repeat as needed to create longer pauses.

Answering calls

When a call is being received, the ringer indicator on the handset flashes.

- Lift the handset and press [>] or
 - You can also answer the call by pressing any dial key from [0] to [9], [X], or [#]. (Any key answer feature)
- When you finish talking, press (>0) or place the handset on the base unit or charger.

Auto talk

You can answer calls simply by lifting the handset off the base unit or charger. You do not need to press []. To turn this feature on, see page 22.

Adjusting the handset ringer volume Push the joystick up or down repeatedly to select the desired volume while the handset is ringing for an incoming call. Note:

• You can also program the handset ringer volume beforehand (page 21).

Useful features during a call

Mute

While mute is turned on, you can hear the other party, but the other party cannot hear you.

- Press during conversation.
 - 🔯 flashes.
- 2 To return to the conversation, press 🔯 again.

Recall/flash

[R/⊕] allows you to use the special features of your host PBX such as transferring an extension call, or accessing optional telephone services.


For call waiting or Call Waiting Caller ID service users

To use call waiting, you must first subscribe to the call waiting service of your service provider/telephone company.

This feature allows you to receive calls while you are already talking on the phone. If you receive a call while on the phone, you will hear a call waiting tone. If you subscribe to both Caller ID and Call Waiting with Caller ID services, the 2nd caller's information is displayed after you hear the call waiting tone on the handset

- Press [R/O] to answer the 2nd call.
- To switch between calls, press [R/⊕].































Making/Answering Calls

Note:

 Please contact your service provider/ telephone company for details and availability of this service in your area.

Handset voice enhancer

This feature clarifies the voice of the person you are talking to, producing a more natural-sounding voice that is easier to hear and understand.

- Press III during a call.
- [v]/[A]: "Voice Enhancer" \rightarrow OK
- [▼]/[▲]: Select "Off", "High Tone", Or "Low Tone". \rightarrow OK

- When this feature is turned on, 👣 is displayed.
- Depending on the condition and quality of your telephone line, this feature may emphasise existing line noise. If it becomes difficult to hear, turn this feature off.
- This feature is not available while using the speakerphone.

Recording a telephone conversation

Important:

- Before recording a conversation, you should inform the other party that the conversation is to be recorded.
- 1 Press I during an outside call.
- 2 [▼]/[▲]: "Record Call" → OK
 - · A beep is heard and recording
 - A beep sounds every 15 seconds and can be heard by the other party.
- **3** To stop recording, press .

• To listen to the recorded conversation, see page 38, 39.

Call share

You can join an existing outside call. To join the conversation, press [] when the other handset is on an outside call

 - "Out of Area": The caller dials from an area which does not provide a Caller ID service.
- "Private Caller": The caller requests not to send caller information.
- If the unit is connected to a PBX system, caller information may not be properly received. Contact your PBX supplier.

Missed calls

If a call is not answered, the unit treats it as a missed call and -) is displayed. This lets you know if you should view the caller list to see who called while you were away. Even if only one missed call in the caller list is viewed (page 31), >> disappears from the display. When you receive another new call, >) is displayed again.

Phonebook name display

When caller information is received and it matches a phone number stored in the phonebook, the stored name in the

phonebook is displayed and logged in the caller list.

Category settings for phonebook

Category settings can help you identify who is calling by using different ringer tones and display colours for different categories of callers. When adding an entry to the phonebook, you can assign it to the desired category (page 18). When a call is received from a caller assigned to a category, the category's display colour and ringer tone you selected are used.

Changing category ringer tones



Using SMS

SMS allows you to send and receive text messages between other fixed-line and mobile phones that support compatible SMS networks and features.

Important:

- To use SMS features, you must:
- subscribe to a Caller ID and/or an appropriate service such as SMS.
- confirm that SMS is turned on.
- confirm that the correct message centre numbers are stored.

Contact your service provider/ telephone company for details and availability.

Using the public mailbox and private mailboxes

SMS messages can be sent and received using the public mailbox or any one of the 6 private mailboxes. The public mailbox can be accessed freely. Private mailboxes are password protected to ensure privacy.

Important:

- To use the public mailbox, you must register the public mailbox with BT Text (page 33).
- To send or receive a message using a private mailbox, you must:
 - first create the private mailbox by storing its name and password (page 35).
 - register each private mailbox with BT Text (page 33).

 A total of 47 messages (at 160 characters/message) in all mailboxes added together can be saved. Total number may be more than 47 if length of messages is less than 160 characters/message.

• If the unit is connected to a PBX system, you may not be able to use SMS features.





Answering system

- Only 1 person can access the answering system (listen to messages, record a greeting message, etc.) at a time.
- When callers leave messages, the unit records the day and time of each message. Make sure the date and time have been set correctly (page

Memory capacity

The total recording capacity (including your greeting message and recorded conversations) is about 40 minutes. A maximum of 64 messages can be recorded.

Note:

- If message memory becomes full:
 - "Messages Full" is shown on the handset display.
 - The answer on indicator on the base unit flashes rapidly when the answering system is turned on.
- When the message memory becomes full:
 - If you use the pre-recorded greeting message, the unit automatically switches to another pre-recorded greeting message asking callers to call again later.

- If you recorded your own greeting message, the same message is still announced to callers even though their messages are not recorded.

Turning the answering system on/off

The answering system is preset to on.


























Answering system settings

Number of rings before the unit answers a call

You can change the number of times the phone rings "Number of Rings" before the unit answers a call. You can select 2 to 7 rings, or "Auto".

The default setting is "4 Rings". "Auto": The unit's answering system answers at the end of the 2nd ring when new messages have been recorded, or at the end of the 5th ring when there are no new messages. If you call your phone from outside to listen to new messages (page 41), you know that there are no new messages when the phone rings for the 3rd time. company to deactivate your voice mail service.

If your service provider/telephone company cannot do this:

- Set this unit's "Number of Rings" setting so that this unit's answering system answers calls before the voice mail service of your service provider/telephone company does. It is necessary to check the number of rings required to activate the voice mail service provided by your service provider/ telephone company before changing this setting.
- Change the number of rings of the voice mail service so that the answering system can answer the call first. To do so, contact your service provider/telephone company.

























Voice Mail Service

Voice mail service

Voice mail is an automatic answering service offered by your service provider/ telephone company. After you subscribe to this service, your service provider/ telephone company's voice mail system answers calls for you when you are unavailable to answer the phone or when your line is busy. Messages are recorded by your service provider/ telephone company, not your telephone. When you have new messages, $\[\[\] \]$ is displayed on the handset if message indication service is available. Please contact your service provider/telephone company for details of this service.

- If ⋈ still remains on the display even after you have listened to new messages, turn it off by pressing and holding [#] for 2 seconds.
- To use the voice mail service provided by your service provider/telephone company rather than the unit's answering system, turn off the answering system (page 37). For details, see page 42.



























Intercom/Locator

Intercom

Intercom calls can be made between handsets in the same radio cell.

- If you receive an outside call while talking on the intercom, you hear interrupt tones. To answer the call, press (>O), then press (>).
























Character entry

The dial keys are used to enter characters and numbers. Each dial key has multiple characters assigned to it. The characters that can be entered depend on the character entry mode (page 47).

- Use the joystick to move the cursor.
- Press dial keys to enter characters and numbers.
- Press C to erase the character or number highlighted by the cursor. Press and hold **C** to erase all characters or numbers.
- Press [★] to switch between uppercase and lowercase.
- To enter another character located on the same dial key, push the joystick right to move the cursor to the next space, then press the appropriate dial key.

Character entry modes

The available character entry modes are Alphabet (ABC), Numeric (0-9), Greek (ABΓ), Extended 1 (AÄÅ), Extended 2 (SŚŠ), and Cyrillic (AБB). For SMS messages, Alphabet (ABC), Numeric (0-9), Greek (ABΓ), and Extended 1 (AÄÅ) modes are available. When in these entry modes except Numeric, you can select which character is entered by pressing a dial key repeatedly.

When the unit displays the character entry screen:





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Error messages

If the unit detects a problem, one of the following messages is shown on the display.

Display message	Cause/solution
Check Phone Line	The supplied telephone line cord has not been connected yet or not connected properly. Check the connections (page 9).
Error	Recording was too short. Try again.
Failed	 Phonebook copy failed (page 20). Confirm the other handset (the receiver) is in standby mode and try again.
Incomplete	The receiver's phonebook memory is full. Erase the unnecessary phonebook entries from the other handset (the receiver) and try again.
Invalid Number	 You tried to send an SMS message to a phone number saved in the phonebook, caller list, or redial list that is over 20 digits long.






















Conditions of guarantee

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





